

Access to Legal Knowledge: *Update*

February 2015 - Pancake breakfast celebrates official launch of Access to Knowledge Initiative

The Law Society of Nunavut (LSN), in partnership with Maliiganik Tukisiiniakvik (MT), officially launched the Access to Knowledge campaign on February 7th, 2015 with a pancake breakfast for the community. A few years in the making, this is the first phase in the much larger Access to Justice Initiative which will be taking place territory wide in the upcoming years.

Held at the Francophone centre, the pancake breakfast gave community members an opportunity to engage with members of the legal community in



an informal setting. It was an opportunity to celebrate this first step in making services more accessible and relatable for all citizens of Iqaluit, as well as a chance for people to ask questions and learn more about the next steps of this initiative. Lawyers from MT, in addition to LSN staff, attended the event with enthusiasm, eager to share this project with those around them and welcome questions anyone might have.
